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Top Elementary School Teacher Interview Questions and STAR-Format Answers

Q1: Can you describe a time when you had to manage a disruptive behavior in your classroom? What steps did you take to address it?

Sample Answer:

In my second year of teaching, I had a student who consistently disrupted lessons by talking loudly out of turn (Situation). My objective was to manage this behavior while maintaining a positive and inclusive classroom atmosphere (Task). I implemented a behavior chart system and rewarded positive behavior, held a parent-teacher meeting, and worked with the student to set clear expectations and goals (Action). Within a month, the student's behavior improved significantly, and the classroom environment became more orderly and conducive to learning (Result).

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Q2: Tell me about a lesson plan you created that was particularly successful. How did you assess its effectiveness?
